Hometown Heroes

Recently, the HAHS Museum was contacted by the family of Edmo Merkel. Edmo was a Hattiesburg native. His family wanted to share his story, and wondered if it could be done in his hometown. While serving in the military during WWI, he became a decorated hero receiving the Distinguished Service Cross, Purple Heart, and the French Forragere. Although he spent much of his life elsewhere, his memorabilia is finally coming home.

Hattiesburg has always honored her heroes. Their names are seen on the columns in our memorial park, and their photographs hang on the walls of buildings named in their honor. Their sacrifices are remember and recognize in ceremonies on Memorial Day and Veterans Day. But what makes one a hero?



True heroes and heroines are more than just names carved in stone or images upon a wall.

Although some paid the "ultimate" cost, living heroes walk among us every day. They will tell you that those who gave their lives in battle are heroes, and they never seem to see themselves as heroic.

Without being unappreciative of the lives given in service to our country, it is important to acknowledge the contributions and influence of those who have lived as heroes. Who are they? Some have served their country in times of war and come home with physical and emotional scares. Others were never in battle, but have supported their country in times of war and peace. In the face of all difficulties, these heroes have continued to meet the obligations of good citizens.

They have raised law abiding families, paid taxes, and voted in every election. They have attended church; run for office; served on the school board; worked with the Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, YMCA, YWCA, and the Junior Auxiliary. They have contributed physically and financially to the American Heart Association American Cancer Society; Salvation Army; American Red Cross; numerous hospitals; drug and abuse prevention organizations; educational, patriotic, arts, historical, and cultural societies; etc. They have taught and coached and preached with their actions as well as their words. In short, they have had the courage and fortitude to be examples and role models in their communities.

The Hattiesburg Area Historical Society would like to recognize some of these heroes and heroines with a **Hometown Heroes** exhibit. This exhibit will feature Edmo Merkel and other Hattiesburg natives. Using newly acquired manikins, original clothing of the heroes, and photographs from the HAHS Collection, the exhibit will "tell the stories" of some interesting people.

The HHS Class of 1944 World War II Monument has been installed on the grounds of the Cultural Center. With the help of Randy Jamison of Woodstone Monument Company, and Ann Jones, Grounds and Maintenance General Manager for the City of Hattiesburg, the WWII Monument and the Class of 1926 Sundial were placed near the parking lot doors. The HAHS is grateful for their work in completing this project.

HAHS Receives IMLS Bookshelf

The Hattiesburg Area Historical Society was selected to receive the *Connecting to Collections Bookshelf*. This set of conservation resources is designed to assist museums, libraries, and archives in caring for their collections. The books are distributed free of charge and are part of the *Connecting to Collections*: *A Call to Action* initiative of the Institute of Museum and Library Services.

The IMLS had many partners in providing these materials. Financial support was provided by the Getty Foundation, the Henry Luce Foundation, and the Samuel H. Kress Foundation. The staff at Heritage Preservation selected books to match HAHS needs. The American Association for State and Local History managed the acquisition and distribution of the *Bookshelf*.

Linda Nguyen, University of Southern Mississippi Luckyday Scholar and museum volunteer, places *The Bookshelf* on a bookcase donated to the museum by Betsy Rowell. The books are available for use by individuals and organizations with questions concerning the care and preservation of their collections.



The Roseberry Case

An anonymous donation in honor of retired elementary school teacher Earline Roseberry has enabled the museum to make a bookshelf into a locking display case with safety glass. The Roseberry case will be used to securely display small items that are temporarily on loan to the museum.
