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
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## HATTIESBURG PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The recent donation of a class composite photo of the first Rowan High School graduating class and an inquiry about an elementary school's name sake were reminders that the HAHS needed to compile information about the people for whom the Hattiesburg schools are named. It was surprising how little was known about some of them and how few of our residents had actually known the individuals or the reasons for their selection.

Before those who know the information are gone or someone wants the buildings renamed, the HAHS had compiled the following research. If you have additional information please call or write us.

# Walthall Elementary School (formerly Court Street School)

(formerly Court Street Schoo Built in **1902.** 

Named for Edmund Cary Walthall a Major General in the Civil War. He was elected to the U.S. Senate from MS in 1885 and served until 1898. Walthall School is where the first PTA in Mississippi was organized. It is currently used as condominiums and as a meeting place for the HHNA (Hattiesburg Historic Neighborhood Association.)

Eaton Elementary School (formerly Third Ward School for whites) Built in 1903.

Named for Sam Eaton a local lumberman who gave the land for the school and enough books to begin the library. The Pinebelt Boys and Girls Club was organized here. Currently it is in a state of disrepair.

Lamar Elementary School (formerly Fourth Ward - Bouie Street School) Built in 1907.

Named for L. Q. C. Lamar, a Mississippi congressman. The school, located at 605 Bouie Street, was closed in 1964 and eventually torn down. The land is inside the Shemper Salvage lot now.

Camp Elementary School (formerly Hardy Street School) Built in 1907.

Named for H.A. Camp, a lumberman, who gave the land and the bricks for the school to be built. It currently serves as the Hattiesburg Public Schools Central Office.

#### **Main Street School**

Hattiesburg Schools started in a cabin on Main Street that was also used for church services. Later official school buildings were built. Built in **1897**—a wood frame building to replace the cabin.

Built in **1898**—a brick building to replace the wood frame building that was condemned in 1911.

Built in **1912**—a brick building to replace the 1898 building. (1912 HHS building shown at right.)

Built in 1922—a brick front (architect Robert E. Lee) to the existing 1912 building. The 1912 and 1922 parts served as the high school until 1959. Later the building served as the Hattiesburg School District Central Office, classrooms for Jr. High students who would later move to Thames, and as the Alternate School.(Photo middle right)

# Main Street Elementary School (part of front section) Built in 1922.

A section of the building built on Main Street was used for an elementary school. These students later attended Davis School. A fire set by arsonists in May 2007 left only the façade of the building standing. Currently the Hattiesburg Historic Downtown Association, which owns the property, has given an option to buy to a developer interested in making the building into condominiums.





# Eureka Community Education Center Built in 1921.

Eureka school was built to serve black students grades 1 – 12. The name Eureka was chosen for the school when a community consensus could not be reached on any other name. It was felt that the Greek word "I have found it" would do. When Royal Street High School and 16th Section Elementary School were built, Eureka became an elementary school. It currently serves as a community education center and EURO museum. (1925 photo at right)





**Jeff Davis Elementary School** (formerly a 1907 frame building known as Columbia Street School). B. J. Allen donated the lot. Built in **1925.** 

Named for Jefferson Davis, cotton farmer and soldier, who served in the U.S. House of Representatives and U. S. Senate. He was the U.S. Secretary of War under President Franklin Pierce and President of the Confederate States of America. Head Start used the building after the Elementary School was closed. The Lighthouse Mission currently occupies this building. (Picture at left taken in 1993)

#### **MORE "POPEPOURRI"**

Information from Mayor Moran Pope, Jr.

- 1. The YMCA formerly occupied the site of the William Colmer Federal Building.
- 2. The residence of lumberman W.S.F. Tatum was on Main Street where the Fire Department is today.
- 3. In 1925 Hattiesburg replaced its street cars with busses.
- 4. Pine Hills neighborhood was originally the Hattiesburg Homesteads.
- 5. From 1909-1925 there were 25 sawmills operating within 15 miles of Hattiesburg.
- 6. The area of the rose garden at USM was once a Sunken Garden.
- 7. May Pole Dances were held at Woman's College (now William Carey University).
- 8. Hattiesburg's first newspaper in 1884 was *The Herald*.

Woodley Elementary School (West End Grammar School ) Built in 1949.

Named for educator F. B. Woodley who served as Superintendent of the Hattiesburg Schools from 1901 to 1921. Previously he taught school in Smith and Scott Counties. Today it is a grades Pre-K – 5 school. (1950 aerial photo at left.)

**Rowan Elementary School** (formerly Rowan and Royal Street High) Built in **1949.** Originally named Royal Street High, it was later named for Levi J. Rowan the

President of Alcorn A. & M. College which is now Alcorn State University. He was the former instructor and mentor of N. R. Berger who was the principal at the time the school opened. Today it serves Pre-K – 5<sup>th</sup> Grades. (1968 photo.)
