Driving on Hardy Street past the ball field at Kamper Park is all it takes to bring back nostalgic memories to long time Hattiesburg residents - especially those whose family members have played on the field for five or more generations. However, it is doubtful that many today can remember the teams in these photos or the game they played there, unless we name them.

The Rotary Club (above) and the Kiwanis Club (photo on following page) were the only two civic clubs at the time, according to information attached with the pictures. "These two pictures are the only authentic record that they ever played a game other than the one played on this occasion-- --- estimated to be during the summer of 1927 or 1928. No newspaper account has ever been found; no official score; and members of both teams have been reluctant to talk."

Another attached note says, "No record of score-number of innings played; spectators-if any-gate receipts. Etc. Come to think of it----I'm sorry I included this item."

After carefully removing the photos from browned scrapbook pages more information appeared: "Hattiesburg Inter-Club baseball Game—Rotary 16 vs Kiwanis 12 about June 1924-1925. BATTERIES ROTARY Dr. Hightower & Gandy KAWANIS Andy Harman & Dr. Bethea."

The baseball field at Kamper Park (currently named Cameron Field) has a long and varied history. It was the first ball field in the city to originally be dedicated for playing ball. Other sites were just empty sand lots or cow pastures until then.

The baseball park was built for the Cotton States Professional Baseball League in the early 1900's, and local team names included the Tar Heels, Woodpeckers, Timberjacks, Hubmen, and the 1949 state semipro champion Pinetoppers. John Moragne used professional road grading equipment pulled by mules to create the infield and mound in 1916 or 1917. The first wood bleachers were built in 1933 by local carpenters. Metal was added in 1949.

The field saw more than just baseball. As early as 1912 the newly formed football team for Mississippi Normal College (USM) played football there against local high schools and the Boy Scouts. Hattiesburg High School continued to play football there until they had a field of their own. Prior to WWII many pro teams including the New York Giants, St Louis Cardinals, and the Philadelphia Athletics played exhibition games here. Elementary school football and recreational football were played there as well. T-ball and fast pitch girls' softball players have also rounded the bases over the years.

Today Kamper Park's Cameron Field is home to Hattiesburg Optimist Club sponsored Dixie Youth Baseballone of the most successful programs in Mississippi.

The "Play Ball!" call, the lights, the covered bleachers, the red clay, and players on the bases stir up fond memories and help preserve Hattiesburg's sporting past.



1. A corbel (a support structure). This particular corbel (courtesy of Tom Phillips III) was probably decorative; it was removed from the Waldoff Building when it was located on East Pine Street.
