

TAKE THE HERITAGE TOUR

APRIL 16-17, 1982

This year Hattiesburg is celebrating its 100th anniversary, and the Hattiesburg Area Historical Society is pleased to be able to open to you houses from Hattiesburg's diverse architectural styles - Queen Anne, Edwardian, and Classical Revival. Two of the houses shown are still occupied by descendants of the builders, both of whom were prominent merchants, bankers and lumbermen, and at one time business partners. Both houses are distinguished mansions of different styles; both proclaim an aura of uncommon splendor. The other two houses were built by an early Hattiesburg doctor, and a prominent lawyer and judge and are excellent examples of their styles.

Turn back the clock to the romantic days of early Hattiesburg. Tour the impressive selection of houses built during the era when lumber was king in South Mississippi, and drive through the lovely old neighborhoods and see the quality outstanding houses that are not open to the public.

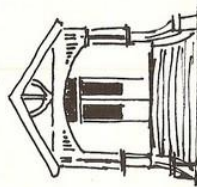
A drive through the downtown section of Hattiesburg will show you many fine early buildings - some of which provided the revenue to build the fine houses.

Stop in downtown and walk around the recently restored Saenger Center and the renovated City Hall, and enjoy the adjacent new downtown park with its unique fountain.

There are two National Register of Historic Places districts in Hattiesburg, the Hub City Historic District, including sections of downtown and the Hattiesburg Historic Neighborhood District. The Saenger Center and the old U.S. Courthouse are also listed on the National Register.

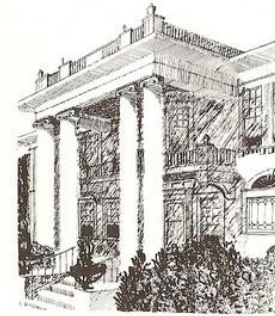

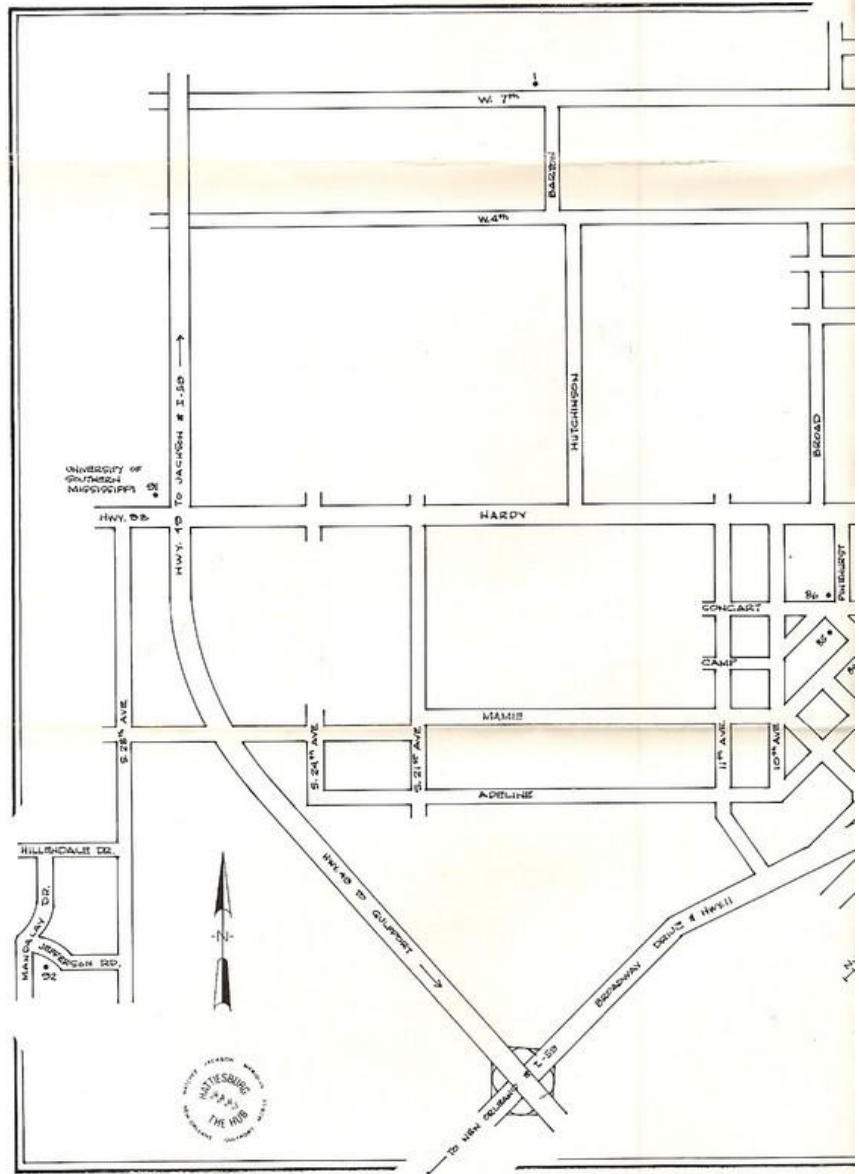

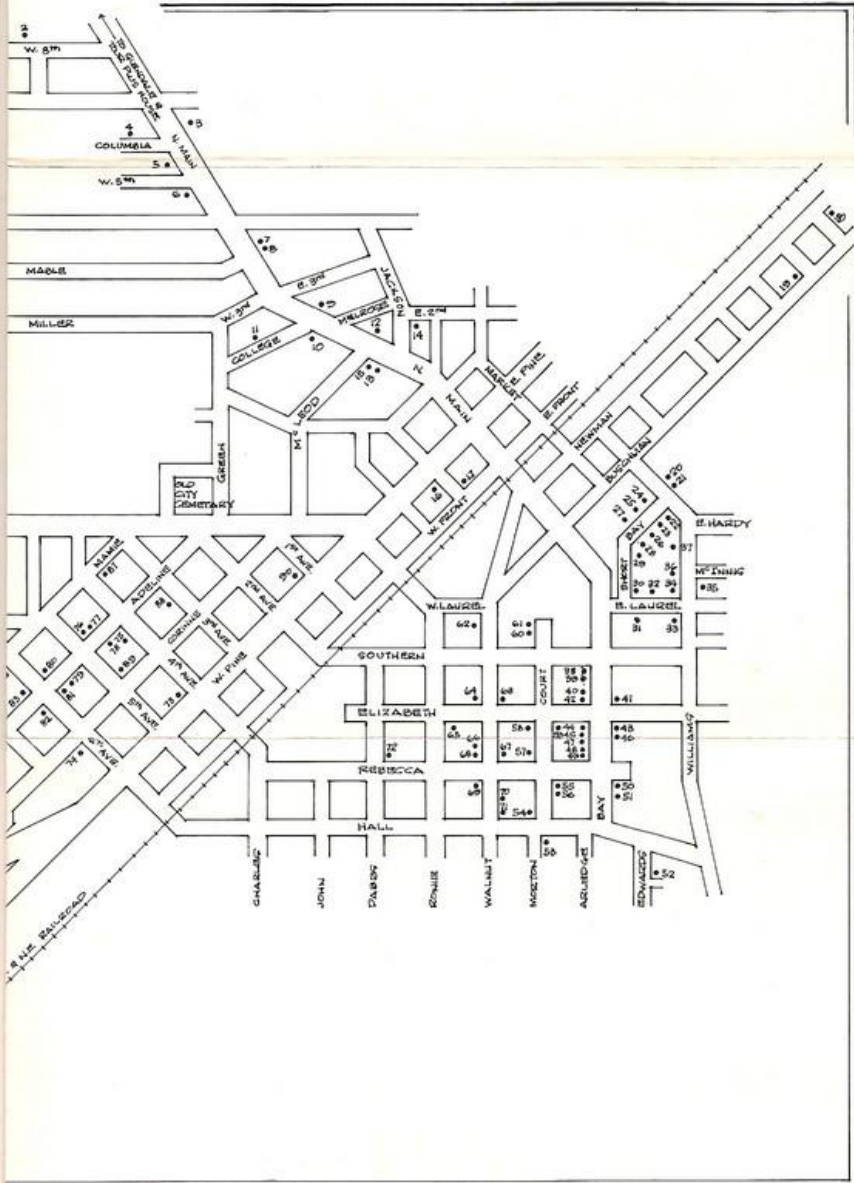

MCLEOD-GILLIAM HOUSE:
802 Main Street

Open: 5 - 7 p.m.

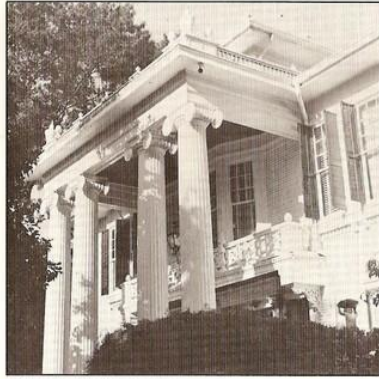
A Landmark House, built in 1897 in splendid Queen Anne style architecture for John A. McLeod, Sr., pioneer merchant and banker. The house has not been altered since it was built and many original furnishings remain. The house is noted for its stained and etched glass, interior woodwork and decorative exterior wood trim. Descendants of the builder still occupy the house.



CRAWFORD-RANDOLPH HOUSE:
301 Court Street

Open: 7 - 9 p.m.

Standing majestically on the crest of a hill, this Italian style villa was built in 1926 by Dr. and Mrs. W. W. Crawford. Dr. Crawford was the organizer of the South Mississippi Infirmary in 1901. Patterned after the house built by Dr. Charles Mayo of Mayo Clinic fame, the house has been renovated by Kathy and Mike Randolph. The furnishings are a mixture of antiques and comfortable modern pieces.



TURNER HOUSE:
500 Bay Street

Open: 7 - 9 p.m.

A Landmark House, 1905, built by John S. Turner, Sr., pioneer landowner, merchant, lumberman, and banker for his eldest son, James Henry Turner and his bride. Constructed of cypress and heart pine, it is particularly noted for its elegant Edwardian and Adam interiors; its 18th century American, English and French antiques; and its notable picture collection. It is owned by the grandson of the builder.

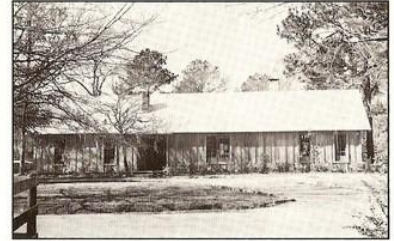


TALLEY-BAILEY HOUSE:
402 Rebecca Avenue

Open: 6 - 8 p.m.

Built in 1907 for Judge John R. Talley, this Classical Revival house has oak mantels with decorative tiles in nearly every room and a striking oak paneled staircase. The house was bought in 1980 by Sidney and Red Bailey who have tastefully restored and furnished the house with antiques.

CARPENTER-HARRINGTON HOUSE:
Go to Glendale, take left fork in road and then take first road to the right.

Open: 7 - 9 p.m.

The original house was built in the 1930's by N. V. Carpenter as a small country house. Neely and Mickey Harrington expanded the house in 1979 for family living. The house has been lovingly furnished with family pieces.
