HATTIESBURG PUBLIC SCHOOLS (Continued from Winter 2015 newsletter)

Grace Love Elementary School (formerly 3rd Ward School for Blacks), Built in 1950.

Named for Grace Love, an educator, who taught school for fifty years including forty years in the city of

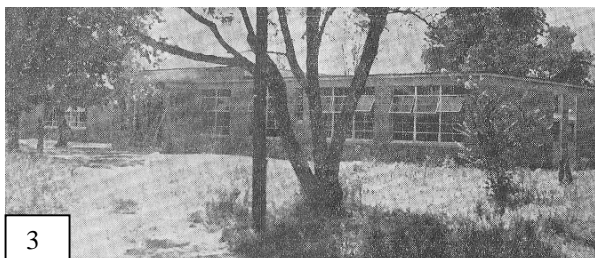

Hattiesburg at the Third Ward School. Today the school is Osceola McCarty Youth Development Center.

Mary Bethune Elementary School (replacing 16th Section School), Built in 1950.

Named for nationally recognized educator and founder of Normal and Industrial School for Girls in Florida. She was a special advisor to President Roosevelt on minority affairs and assistant to the Secretary of War for selection of the first officer candidates in the School for WACs in 1942.

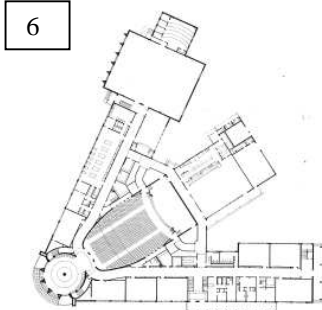

G. L. Hawkins Elementary School (formerly Junior High), Built in 1951.

Named for prominent Hattiesburg businessman George L. Hawkins who donated the land for the school. He was the first president of the First National Bank of Hattiesburg which became First Mississippi National Bank and is currently

Bancorp South. The school's unique architecture by Noah Webster Overstreet, the first native architect born near Hattiesburg, incorporated poured-in-place concrete, introduced in the early 1900s. The building, designed in the shape of a space ship, featured a mushroom cloud column in the middle of the rotunda entrance. It is currently an elementary school grades Pre-K – 5.

Grace Christian Elementary School, Built in 1958.

Named for educator Grace Christian who taught school in Hattiesburg from 1903 until 1945. She first taught seventh grade. Next she taught at Camp School. Then she served at Court Street School (Walthall School) where she was principal from 1905 until 1945 when she retired. At the dedication ceremonies in 1958, Miss Christian was congratulated by three generations of her students. It is currently an elementary school grades Pre-K-5.

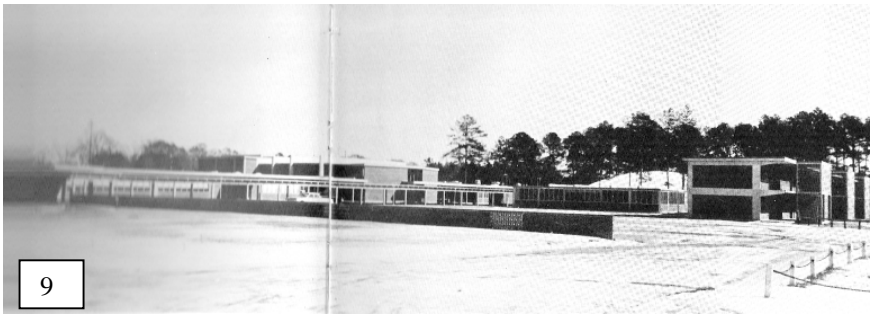


W. H. Jones Elementary School (formerly Elementary and Junior High), Built in 1958.

Named for W. H. Jones who was a teacher in Hattiesburg schools and principal of Sixth Street School (replaced by Eureka School) beginning in 1918 and for a number of years there after. He was the first to propose Eureka School. Today the building is used by Head Start.

Hattiesburg High School (S. H. Blair Center), Built in 1959.

The original building was named in honor of Stephen Henry Blair, Sr. long-time teacher, coach, principal, and superintendent in Hattiesburg Public Schools. He started in Hattiesburg in 1923 and retired in 1966. (Blair's

name was added to the high school campus on Hutchinson Avenue at the end of 1968. When all tenth graders attended Rowan and eleventh and twelfth grades were held at Hutchinson Avenue, the campuses were referred to as the Blair Campus of Hattiesburg High and the Rowan Campus of Hattiesburg High. In 2003, the

Freshman Academy was added to the High School campus. Today Hattiesburg High School has grades nine through twelve.

Lillie Burney Elementary School/STEAM Academy (formerly Elementary and Junior High School), Built in 1963.

Named for Lillie Burney educator, teacher, and principal of the 16th Section School (now Mary Bethune) for 37 years. She retired on her 70th birthday on February 28, 1959. The community was so excited while the school was being built that the building and grounds were left open to allow the public to view the project after work, an activity that the danger of lawsuits and theft would prevent today. During construction there were no reported injuries and nothing was stolen. Today the 6th grade STEAM Academy occupies the building.

W. I. Thames Elementary School (formerly Junior High and Elementary), Built in 1962-1964.

Named for educator W. I. Thames. In 1906 he established South Mississippi College (where William Carey University stands today). He was principal and superintendent in several Mississippi towns. He served as Hattiesburg Superintendent of Schools from 1922 to 1939. Today Thames Elementary serves students in grades Pre-K through 5th grade.

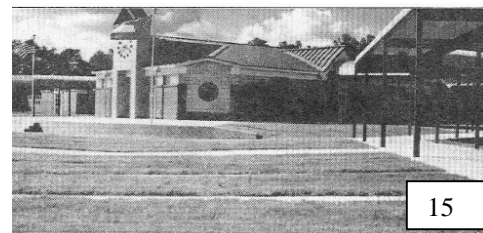

N. R. Burger Middle School, Built in 1999.

Named for N. R. Burger educator and principal. He began teaching mathematics in Magnolia, MS. In 1936 he became principal of Hopewell Vocational School in Covington County. In 1940, he became principal of Eureka High School, which became Rowan High School. He became Rowan's first principal and served there until his retirement in 1974. It was Burger who suggested the Rowan name.
