The class of '57 just completed the restoration of their class composite and the class of '48 is working on theirs. If you know of any composite that needs a home, we would love to add it to our hallways.

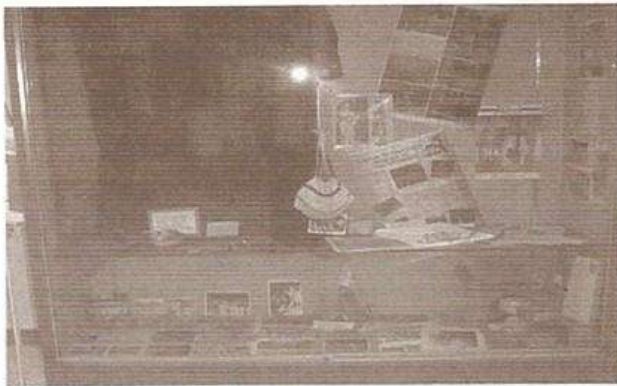
I can not close without mentioning my pet project...the keel boat. We have gotten the formula that we need to start treating it. The boat must first be cleaned, then sprayed with an insecticide, fungicide product. We then wait and spray it with a water seal treatment. All this will be monitored by digital photography by our contact at East Carolina University, a Professor of Nautical Archaeology, Maritime Studies Program. This same process is being done on a steamer hull pulled from Lake Michigan in the late 1970's. Joanne Newcomb has offered to make sure that the first round of the pesticide product is applied. I am still in pursuit of a home for our boat to be put on display. With the tourist traffic a display of this kind would be a great asset to our area.

CAMPING KNOTS AND CAMPING NOTS...

What do square knots, campfires, s'mores, and cookies bring to mind? Girl Scouts, of course. What do names like Daisy, Juliette Gordon, Lord and Lady Baden-Powell, and Agnes Baden-Powell have to do with Girl Scouting? And what about Savannah, Hattiesburg, Biloxi, Gulfport, Jones County, Forrest County, Camp Dantzer, Black Creek, Gulf Pines, Wiggins, Maxie, and Iti Kana? Do you know about the left-hand shake, Be Prepared, and international friendship?

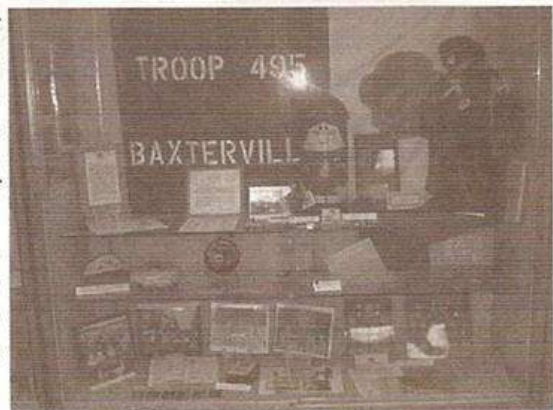
If you don't know drop by the HAHS Museum, take a trip back through our 90 Years of Girl Scouting exhibit, and find out. Tour through GSUSA history from its national beginning on March 12, 1912 to its Hattiesburg debut in 1934. Learn about the growth of the local council from a 1945 office in City Hall to a 15 county council in 1960 to today's expanded service area of 21 counties that stretches from the Gulf Coast to Meridian and includes two camps.

Many interesting pieces of local and national Scouting history can be seen. There are dozens of old photographs in which to look for yourself or friends. A number of old uniforms are on display. Badges, awards, handbooks, jewelry, and other scouting equipment and collectibles fill the cases. Look for the nail from founder Juliette Low's home and a suitcase that helped a local troop travel across Europe. Step inside the wall tent, on loan from the Gulf Pines Council, and remember what it felt like when you went troop camping.

While you are there try your skill at identifying the Camping Knots and Camping Nots on the activity board. Former Scouts should ask for a biographical sketch form to fill out for the Girl Scout Alumnae Register we are trying to create. No one should feel left out for it is a well known fact that Girl Scout campouts and events often included fathers, brothers, and boyfriends. If you were ever a participant with a troop, we would like to know.

When Juliette Low decided to form the first troop she told a friend, "Come right over. I've got something for the girls of Savannah, and all of America, and all of the world, and we're going to start it tonight." For those of you who think Girl Scouts have nothing to do with your life, it might interest you to know that the HAHS President, Vice President, Secretary, and several of the HAHS Board members were (and some of them still are) Girl Scouts.

With over 45 million living GSUSA alumnae, surely every person living in the United States today has been influenced by a Girl Scout. If you haven't, drop by the HAHS Museum today or call for a group reservation. We'll try to "Be Prepared" to help you.
